

#### Christmas Joy Offering Christmas Eve 2025

Each year on Christmas Eve, our church has its Christmas Joy Offering. This Joy Offering is one of four denominational wide offerings throughout the year and according to PCUSA, the Christmas Joy Offering has been a cherished Presbyterian tradition since the 1930's. The offering distributes gifts equally to the Assistance Program of the Board of Pensions and to Presbyterian related schools and colleges equipping communities of color. The Assistance Program provides critical financial support to church workers and their families. Presbyterian related schools and colleges provide education and leadership development while nurturing racial and ethnic heritage. This has been a Presbyterian commitment for nearly 140 years.

In order to understand this program better, here is the example of how the money was spent in 2022:

- \$1.1 million in gifts that year were used to provide critical financial support and grants for current and retired Presbyterian church workers in their time of need.
- 272 retired church workers and surviving spouses were helped.
- 223 recipients were able to stay in their homes, assisted living, or longterm care.
- 621 Emergency Assistant Grants helped people facing economic hardship.

The Kingdom of God is a hidden treasure in our midst. *Luke 17:20 - 25*Nor will people say, "Here it is," or "There it is," because the kingdom of God is in your midst. *Luke 17:21b* (NIV)

He meets us in our pain.


He cries with us.

#### Presbytery of SE Illinois Recognizes Francophone Bethesda Fellowship

Francophone Bethesda Fellowship was recognized at the 461st Stated Meeting of the Presbytery of Southeastern Illinois on November 8. "At this stated meeting we approved the first New Worshipping Community in the Presbytery of Southeastern Illinois! The Francophone Bethesda Fellowship (housed in the Champaign, First, congregation) has its genesis in a group of French-speaking congregants, mainly from Congo, who desired a worship service in French as well as a worship style that felt more comfortable and meaningful to them. With the support of a \$10,000 Mission Program Seed Grant from the PCUSA, this Worshipping Community not only shares a rich worship service with the Francophone community in Champaign-Urbana, but also is poised to engage in outreach to their neighbors in this community.

Gabriel Mboyo, who was present at this stated meeting, and his wife, Solange, along with other Francophone Bethesda leaders affirmed that "the help of the Holy Spirit encourages us to adopt an attitude of compassion, kindness and generosity to our neighbors, to reach out to those in need, to cultivate relationships based upon respect and kindness, to build a community where peace and harmony reign. Please welcome our friends in ministry in the Francophone Bethesda Fellowship."

#### Tell me about yourself and your family.

I am the second of five siblings raised by my mom. My father passed when I was four. I attended boarding schools for my primary and secondary education, then attended the Technical University of Kenya, majoring in mathematics. I then did a master's degree in Ghana, followed by three years of teaching in Kenya.

# How did you get to Champaign-Urbana and the University of Illinois?

I came to Michigan State University to study industrial mathematics for two years and then came to the University of Illinois where I will spend five years on a PhD in actuarial sciences. You may think I live to learn and that is true. Ultimately, I hope to teach at the university level.

#### How would you describe your experience in the US?

Everything is big here-big schools, big homes and big expenses.

#### How have you adjusted to the culture?

First, while my native language is English, the pronunciation, volume and rhythm are different. We use some words different from British English. Another difference is that professors in the U.S are like buddies but in Kenya or Ghana, they are formal authoritarians and do not consider students their friends. Public communication with strangers is also different. When you meet an American, they keep the conversation formal, but when you meet a Kenyan, you get a deep detailed life story.

#### Tell me about your faith journey.

I grew up in the Presbyterian Church of East Africa. We have three Sunday worships. There are similarities to First Champaign in what we call "main worship". The difference I see is that our order of worship is a bit different and we have more congregational participation in worship. We also have a Youth Forum for ages 18-35 when we eat and have bible-based discussions. Prayer groups meet in person twice a week and on weekends. Everyone is expected to participate in a small group and there are many choices to choose from.

#### What else would you like people to know about you?

I am happy to be in Champaign and at First Presbyterian Church. I enjoy helping in Sunday School, Easy English Fellowship, Trunk N Treat and Family Game Time. I am settling into my first semester but hope I can become more involved with the congregation going forward. Thank you for including me.

#### **Financial Update**

#### **Contributions**

Total October contributions: \$46.6K from plate and pledge plus \$7.9K from prepaid= \$54.5K This is \$23.1k more than last year and \$10.6K under budget. Total contributions YTD, including prorated prepaid pledges: \$624.1 K which is \$16.1k more than last year and \$26.9K under budget. At 83.3% of the year, we have 81.9% of the budgeted contributions, including all prepaid contributions.

#### **Expenses**

October expenses were \$84.6 K, which is \$17.2 more than last year and \$5.6k over budget. Expenses YTD are \$787.3K, which is \$3.3K more than last year and \$2.7K under budget. At 83.3% of the year, we have spent 83.1% of the budget.

#### **Balance YTD**


Revenue from all sources exceeded expenses by \$20,903. Last year at this time there was a deficit of \$76K.


#### **Session Designated Funds**


\$1,008,462 which is \$1619 more than last month.
