Most of us know our IQ (intelligence quotient), but what about our SQ (spiritual quotient)?

Lent is a good time to think about the quality of your spiritual life. Do you think about God often...or rarely? Do you pray often...or occasionally? How well do you know the Bible? The Commandments? The Beatitudes? The lives of biblical heroes and heroines?

During Lent, commit to spending more time in prayer. Also consider selecting a book of the Bible or a particular Bible character to study indepth during this period.

Some people give up particular items or habits during Lent. If used wisely, this discipline can help you abandon things that have been interfering with your relationship with God.

Seek out devotions and books that can help strengthen your spiritual life.




### **Contributions**


Contributions in February were \$8K less than in 2018 and \$10K below the budget at \$66K. The Year to Date total is below last year by \$41K and below the budgeted amount by \$35K. These figures include prepaid pledges (those paid in the year prior to the budget year) that are prorated over the year with 1/12 added to each month's contributions. Including all revenue sources, at 16.7% through the year, we have received 20.6% of the expected 2019 revenue.

### **Expenses**

Year to Date expenses are \$11K below the budget at \$166K but more than in 2018 by \$22K. Considering all sources, revenue exceeds expenses by \$46K which is \$113K less than at the end of February in 2018. This figure includes \$32K less in prepaid pledges than in 2018. At 16.7% through the year we have experienced 15.6 % of the expected 2019 expenses.

### What are your favorite bible characters?


Adam and Eve (Charles). Abraham (Sylvie). David (Monique). Adam and Eve

# Sunday School Notes There will NOT be Sunday school on March 17. Too many volunteer teachers will be absent for the first weekend of Spring Break week.

In February our preschool class focused on "I say thank you." The elementary classes learned the story of Jesus healing the ten lepers, but only one returning to thank him. They also began to learn about Jesus feeding the 5,000. The Middle School class worked on their Bible skills and learned about Simon Peter and the Sadducees and Pharisees. The high school continued to study the lectionary texts through Feasting on the Word for youth.

In March the preschool class is learning "I take care of my body" and "Jesus is my Friend." The elementary classes are continuing the unit of the Feeding of the 5,000 and will begin to learn the stories of Holy Week in 'Jesus in Jerusalem.' The Middle School will continue working on Bible skills, and study the Bible ancestors Mary and Martha and Judas Iscariot.

The third grade Bible class will be starting March 24 and finish April 7. Students will receive their Bibles on April 17. **Kathy Schoeffmann**, **Lauren Walsten** and **Nancy Pippin** have volunteered to be the teaching team for this short course

on basic Bible skills and learning the ten

commandments.

### Youth Group

All church Pancake Breakfast Sunday, March 10 10-11 AM in Centennial Hall. Cost of the pancake breakfast is donation based and all proceeds go to the youth summer trip.

The Youth have been working hard to raise money for Triennium this summer and are excited about going. Last month the youth group met and studied the importance of worship and looked at different ways we worship God while also enjoying fellowship together.

During Lent, the middle school and high school students will meet together for a special Sunday evening study called *Just Eating*, which looks at how we practice our faith at the table. Through this study, we will examine how our faith is a foundation for a meaningful and healthy life not only for ourselves but for the earth and others in the world. We will talk about how eating is an invitation to experience God and to walk with others in the world.

In Sunday School the high schoolers will be studying how to put our faith into action during Lent. We will be using the Bible Project video series on the Gospel of Luke to explore the life of Jesus that leads us to the Cross and the Resurrection.
