When my grandfather (Deda) died, my grandmother (Baba) slowly adjusted to life without him. She eventually emptied his closets and his drawers and gave my parents his car, a brand-new 1971 Chevy Impala. She didn't drive, so she didn't need a car. She also didn't do woodworking, so she gave my father most of Deda's power tools.

The garage was where Deda's woodshop was. There was a chest-high wooden box into which Deda threw his wood scraps. He fed these scraps into the fire of the potbellied stove, which took the chill off Tidewater Virginia's winters.

Baba was big into cleaning. Everything in her house always sparkled. And, after Deda died, everything in the garage sparkled, too.

While she gave a lot away, including his big pieces of lumber, she kept the wood box. And piece by piece she'd dig through it, and one by one she'd sand down Deda's scraps. She'd glue them together into wood-block sculpture. She'd stain or paint her creations. One of my favorites is called "Extravaganza." She did it in 1973 and even signed it.

I loved what she did with Deda's leftovers. He took these pieces of wood for granted. But she handled each scrap of wood gently, in a holy way, looking at each piece with imagination. My dad did this with the blocks of wood from which he carved his shore birds. Baba thought, "What can I do with this piece?" And, "What piece would go nicely with this piece?" With sandpaper, glue, patience, and love my grandmother made something extraordinary from simple scraps of wood.

When you look at these 'sculptures,' some just see scraps of wood. I see Baba and Deda, and their love for each other, and their love for their eightyear-old grandson named Matt.

Jesus took bread and wine.

Jesus took bread and wine and did something extraordinary with it. This bread and wine were already sacred, symbolizing the mighty acts of God in the Passover. In this Passover Feast, the bread was unleavened, a sign of bread that is made quickly, by a people fleeing captivity. (We just read about the Passover from Exodus.) This was a bread made and eaten on the go. The bread reminded the Jews that they had once been a people on the run—chased by an army across the Red Sea into a wilderness.

The wine reminded them of happier times—and of the future, when God would make all things new. The fruit of the vine is a symbol of joy. Wine brings happiness. It is not drunk on the run, but at a feast in celebration. This wine reminded the once enslaved Hebrews that they had been delivered and were free. And that God could be trusted in the future, even under Roman occupation. Hallelujah.

Jesus took these ordinary gifts that already symbolized God's saving grace and made something even more extraordinary.

"This is my body," he said, amazingly, "broken/given for you."

And, "This cup is the new covenant, sealed in my blood, shed for the forgiveness of your sin."

"Do this in remembrance of me."

It's just ordinary bread and ordinary juice. There's nothing particularly gourmet about it. But the bread forever reminds us of Jesus' body, which he gave for us—in friendship, in love, for all time. And the juice reminds us of Jesus's blood, which he shed for us. Do this in remembrance. And we do.



Finance

Financial Update

Contributions

Contributions in April to the Operating Fund were \$12.7K less than in 2019 but \$16.2K above the budget at \$93.7K. The Year to Date total is below last year by \$26.7K and below the budgeted amount by \$8.5K. These figures include prepaid pledges (those paid in the year prior to the budget year) that are prorated over the year with I/I2 added to each month's contributions. Including all revenue sources, at 33.3% through the year, we have received 55.9% of the expected 2020 revenue.

Expenses

Year to Date expenses are \$18.5K above the budget at \$376.0K and more than in 2019 by \$27.2K. At 33.3% through the year we have experienced 35.1% of the expected 2020 expenses.

Balance


Considering all sources, revenue exceeds expenses by \$201.7K which is \$114.2K better than at the end of April in 2019. This figure includes \$61.9K more in prepaid pledges than in 2019.


Our positive balance is substantially due to the receipt of \$134.2K from the Federal Paycheck Protection Program established by the CARES Act. This provides funding to continue to pay all salaries and some other expenses during the current economic crises.


Restricted Donations

Session Motions Passed At April Meeting

- That First Presbyterian Church submit an application and enter into a Paycheck Protection Program loan, provided by the CARES Act, and the Session authorize the Finance Chairman, Mark Schoeffmann, to sign all necessary documents for this loan on behalf of the Church.
- That First Presbyterian Church enter into a \$500,000 line of credit agreement with Hickory Point Bank and Trust, shall grant Hickory Point Bank and Trust a collateral assignment against the funds of the Church that are invested with Cozad Asset Management, Inc. account number JFD-029531 to secure said loan and authorize the Finance Chair, Mark Schoeffmann, to sign all necessary documents for this line of credit agreement on behalf of the church.
- Approval for an additional \$5,000.00, above the original \$20,715.00 contingency which was approved in January Session. This will pay for the \$1,146.06 overage in addition to any unexpected cost moving forward, including kitchen equipment.
 - Approval of needed changes for kitchen renovation.
- That Session approve Debra Miller's wishes to be removed from Session, and that the Clerk of Session, compose a letter of gratitude for her service, and to express that she would continue to be in our thoughts and prayers.

Canteen Run

The Canteen Run program has recently changed, yet the mission to serve their street friends remains the same!

Scheduled stops and inclusion of awesome volunteers in the truck has been replaced with one driver going out Monday thru Thursday, sometimes Friday, delivering the same essential items (sack lunch, t-shirts, underwear, socks, and hygiene to name a few) to street friends.

The only scheduled stops now are at Austins Place, serving about 14 woman, and C-U at Home, serving about 50 men. All 64 of these men and women have no other shelter options, and are Champaign Urbana's chronic homeless.

In addition to the drops at the shelters, the drivers are driving around looking for individuals on the street at night, building

a phone number list for street friends that refuse to shelter. Text messages connect the drivers each night with friends so we can locate them and make sure they have what they need.

The Canteen Run is still counting on all of their supporters for the needed donations to support the Canteen Run efforts. If you are able to donate t-shirts, underwear, or other items, please message them, and they will arrange to pick up those items from you.
