No twitching and whimpering in her dreams as she chases squirrels or does whatever dogs do in their dreams. Rest In Peace Medical Debt

The Problem

Right now, about \$1.7 million dollars of medical debt is owed by people living below or near the poverty level in the 44 counties of our presbytery. This debt doesn't come from bad decisions—it comes from seeking life-saving medical care. With medical debt on their credit report, our neighbors can't get a job, rent a home, get a loan, or buy a car. Medical debt locks our neighbors into poverty.

A Remedy

RIP Medical Debt (ripmedicaldebt.org/) is one of several organizations started by individuals from the debt-collection field who want to forgive debt instead of collecting it. They pool money from donors to buy medical debt in large portfolios. They then contact those families and forgive their debt with no tax consequences for the donors or recipients. \$17,000 leveraged through RIP Medical Debt can wipe out much of southeastern Illinois' \$1.7 million dollars of medical debt.

Our Response

Our presbytery has decided to demonstrate Christ's love to our neighbors in a concrete way. By our May 13th presbytery meeting, we are attempting to raise \$17,000 and partner with RIP Medical Debt to wipe out most of the medical debt in southeastern Illinois. That's only about \$3.40 per member of our presbytery. By pooling our resources, we can make a huge impact on those in need in our communities and often in our own congregations.

Finance

Financial Update

Contributions

Contributions in January to the Operating Fund were \$21.6K more than in 2020 and \$8.2K above the budget at \$81.3K. These figures include prepaid pledges (those paid in the year prior to the budget year) that are prorated over the year with 1/12 added to each month's contributions. Including all revenue sources, including \$95.9K in prepaid pledges, at 8.3% through the year we have received 19.6% of the expected year's revenue.

Expenses

Year to Date expenses are \$9.4K below the budget at \$75.6K and less than in 2020 by \$18.9K. At 8.3% through the year we have experienced 7.4% of the expected year's expenses.

Balance

Considering all sources, revenue exceeds expenses by \$116.8K which is \$6.7K less than at the end of January in 2020.

Restricted Funds

In addition to contributions to the operating fund there was \$10,131 donated in January to special offerings and funds restricted to specific purposes such as missions supported by our church and \$21,000 to endowments.

Stewardship

Thanks to the responses of 173 families pledging \$780,118, we have reached 95% of our projected pledge commitments for 2021. The winter has seen a brisk rise in cases and in deaths in Cuba. On January 27 Cuba reported 24, 205 cases and 210 deaths. At the same time the State of Illinois reported 1,121,000 cases and 19,138 deaths.

Cuba is in the process of converting its monetary system to a single currency. The tourist industry on which Cuba depends is on pause.

Do you have a stash of Styrofoam? Keep on saving—from landfills and oceans.

W.F. Dart founded a company in 1937 that manufactured small plastic and steel items such as key cases and toys. In the late 1950s, they began making cups out of a new product now known as Styrofoam and became the Dart Container Corporation.

It's estimated that non-biodegradable Styrofoam can take up 30% of the space in landfills and last at least 500 years. Up to 20% of it ends up in water.

Dart paid attention to this and established collection centers for foam with the number 6 in a triangle with chasing

arrows, as well as big pieces used in packaging. We're lucky to have such a center in Urbana, so let's use it. They sell the compact-



ed foam to manufacturers of picture frames, interior molding, pens, rulers and foam packaging,

Please start or continue saving clean Styrofoam for a collection event at church in April.
