


Ash Wednesday February 22

Hello!

I am looking forward to serving as one of your Sabbatical Pastors for the next month. My role will be as acting head of staff to help with communication and response as various needs arise, working closely with your wonderful (and very able) team. I will also be preaching for you a couple of times, as well as once for The Windsor, and presenting a Faith in Real Life session.

I was born and raised in Lubbock, Texas. I met my late husband John there while we were both in college and grad school. We moved to Champaign in 1978 when he took a job with the Corps of Engineers lab here. Our son Matt and his wife, Theresa, live in Issaquah, WA, with their nine-year-old twins, Caroline and Elena. Our daughter Mara and her husband Jason live a few blocks away from me in Champaign, with their four-year-old Beatrice.

Although I was raised in what was then a moderate Southern Baptist church, our family began attending Westminster Presbyterian Church in Champaign in 1988. Part of my responsibilities include being the Director of the John Bandy Center for Spirituality and Faith, named in memory of my husband who was a member of CUCC for more than twenty years. The Center serves as a resource library and a "home" for ongoing groups, classes and seasonal retreats.

I am excited to have the opportunity to get to know more about First Pres, Champaign, and all of you. There are so many wonderful things going on! May God bless us in our time together!

I have been reading the book "From Borsch to Burgers" by Ruslana A. Westerlund. Ruslana grew up in Ukraine and came to

the United States in college. Her book is a cross-cultural memoir that highlights both language and cultural understandings that challenge ELLs. For example, some cultures (or people within a culture) may demonstrate direct communication while others prefer indirect communication.

One group places a high value on politeness and communicates indirectly while others emphasize honesty that may sometimes appear rude. Neither is wrong but different approaches can create misunderstanding.

A newcomer may translate the words only to discover the other person's message is different from the literal translation. "I wish I could go" are the words spoken but in some cases, it is a polite way of saying "I'm not interested." A new English speaker may pretend to understand someone's words but have no idea what the person meant.

The only way for English Language Learners to figure out cultural norms is to spend time with native speakers. Why not consider inviting ELLs into your home for a Valentine meal?

"I want to get out and meet people so I won't feel alone with my problems."


"Everyone around me speaks my language so I have no one to help me with speaking English."

Financial Update

Contributions

Total December contributions: \$76.8K from plate and pledge plus \$10.2K from prepaid= \$87K
This is \$39.2K less than last year and \$14.7K over budget
Total contributions YTD: \$900.4K which is \$21.9K more than last year and \$32.4K over budget.
At 100% of the year, we have 103.7% of the budgeted contributions.

Expenses

December expenses were \$105.4 K which is \$7.1 K less than last year and \$20.2K over budget.

Expenses YTD were \$986.7K which is \$93.1K less than last year and \$35.2K under budget.


At 100% of the year, we have spent 96.55% of the budget.


Balance YTD
