Snippets from Your Pastor/Love in Action

A friend told me about an exchange he had with a friend. Conversation somehow got to face masks, Covid, and Trump. He said he was no fan of Trump. She thought Trump had hung the moon. They spared a bit, and then they laughed. They agreed they'd never agree on that. But—and here's the kicker—they still loved each other anyway.

Mutual forbearance. That's what that's called. And that is one of the "foundations" of Presbyterian polity. Theologically and constitutionally, we believe that sometimes we must agree to disagree. This is how our PCUSA Book of Order puts it:

[W]e . . . believe that there are truths and forms with respect to which men [people] of good characters and principles may differ. And in all these we think it the duty both of private Christians and societies to exercise mutual forbearance toward each other. (From the Synod of New York and Philadelphia, 1788).

My late friend Johnnie Underwood would add this: "And we can disagree without being disagreeable."

BUT, loving each other by exercising mutual forbearance is increasingly difficult. "America has a scorn problem," says By Tish Harrison Warren, an Anglican priest who reflects on matters of faith for the NYTimes.

A Scientific American report on political polarization noted that Americans increasingly hold "a basic abhorrence for their opponents — an 'othering' in which a group conceives of its rivals as wholly alien in every way." It continues, "This toxic form of polarization has fundamentally altered political discourse, public civility and even the way politicians govern." A 2019 study by Pew said, "55 percent of Republicans say Democrats are 'more immoral' when compared with other Americans; 47 percent of Democrats say the same about Republicans."

We find one another repugnant — not just wrong but bad. Our rhetoric casts the arguments of others as profound moral failings.[1]

We despise people who don't think like us. If we cannot be neighbors and have conversations with one another about the day's hot topics, then we cannot practice democracy.

Mutual forbearance. Being good neighbors. Agreeing to disagree. Growing closer and deeper. This communion leads to answers, to the possibility of friendship, and to a more hopeful tomorrow.

If Jesus is the vine and we are the branches, then we belong together, we live together, we grow together.

These are some ways we can put the walk into the talk of love. Yes, love is the answer, but we are the agents of God's love in this place. As disciples of Jesus, we are the hands and feet of God's love. Consider loving the world in this way:

- 1. Support public education. I pray the Buffalo and Tesas shooters had great teachers in school, a great system of academic and socio-emotional support. But maybe they didn't. Maybe these young men were tough kids and got pushed to the margins. Maybe there wasn't a teacher or a coach or a school nurse who could make the positive difference for them. All education is good, of course. But public education touches most of our kids. Not every family can homeschool, and most parents cannot afford sending their kids to private school. Public education must succeed in our county. Tutor kids. Coach soccer. Support local public schools.
- 2. Support mental health. We can help (1) raise awareness about the challenges those living with mental health and addiction issues face. We can (2) work to reduce the stigma many experience. When people have mental health needs, there are fewer a fewer affordable places they can go. Support mental health.
- 3. Have a conversation about gun violence. What's the answer, or

answers? Should we ban assault weapons? Why didn't the NY "redflag law" work? Let's get beyond the heated rhetoric that "Guns don't kill people, people kill people." Let's move on. Let's go deeper. These conversations are important for both our nation and our community. Gun violence, after all, has found its way to Champaign County in a big way We lost a DREAAMer in June to gunshot wounds. A Journal of Pediatrics study found that "the number of young people carrying a handgun was 41 percent higher during the years 2015 to 2019, than in the period 2002 to 2006.[2] Is this a good thing? Let's talk about guns.

- 4. We can talk about race. If you are black, Asian, Jewish, immigrant, transgender, gay, lesbian, or queer you are at a significantly higher risk of being subject to a hate crime perpetrated by a young, white male. What are we doing to stand against hateful rhetoric like "replacement theory"? All of us need to talk about race, white people especially.
- 5. We can support our very own DREAAM House. DREAAM seeks to disrupt the school-to-prison pipeline by replacing it with an opportunity pipeline stocked with caring mentors, a great after school program, and summer activities designed to help kids do well academically and to thrive emotionally. We are building a community of support around vulnerable children and youth. On Tuesday evening there was no parking here because Centennial Hall was filled with DREAAMers and families learning about an upcoming basketball program. Good news is happening in DREAAM, and your church supports it.

If we think that loving the world only means having occasional warm thoughts about others, that's short-sighted. Love is the answer, and that means we put the pedal to the metal and get going. If we don't know how to put love into gear, we probably aren't thinking very hard.

Our hope and help is Jesus. Jesus says abide in me. The branch can't make it without the vine. The disciple can't make it without the teacher. Love can't make it when it is cut off from its source. Abide in me, Jesus says. Walk humbly and closely.

Dare to love the world in the name and manner of Jesus, our Lord. We can do it. We must do it. And with God's help, we will.

AMEN.


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Worship With Us Sunday, July 17

What do you do in your free time?



I Was in Prison and...

"When did we see you sick or in prison and visit you?" Matthew 25:39

Jesus Is the Way Prison Ministry (JITW) housed in Rantoul, serves the incarcerated and the recently incarcerated. It is a long-standing mission partner. Bible study and prayer are offered at Champaign County Jail and Illinois prisons. The "New Beginnings" residential transitional program provides Christian support, counseling and education as men readapt to life "on the outside" and enter the workforce.

New executive director, Brian Ziefang and board member Roy Davis discussed their ministry with an audience of fifteen in Mae Chapin Parlor on June 9. Brian offered a devotion reminding us that Apostle Paul was a prisoner and never looked back but looked forward accomplishing old I was repeatedly molested by a his remarkable ministry for Jesus. Residents at JITW are similarly encouraged to keep their eyes on the future glancing back occasionally to reinforce what they have overcome. Two current residents shared their life stories and described the Christian love and direction they are receiving. Mr. Davis closed the meeting with a moving personal testimony.

A rich ninety-minute conversation included discussion of the JITW Miracle of Christmas gift program. Gifts are wrapped for children. Mentors by Mail is a pen pal program. A garden program on site is in process. Residents value invitations to dinner out or prepared food brought to them. Transportation is a needed contribution. This testimony was shared by a formerly incarcerated client of Jesus Is The Way Prison Ministry. It is shared with his permission.

My Short Testimony

Between the ages of 3 to 4 1/2 years man my mom was seeing. When I was 5 my mom went to prison for being involved in the murder of said man. I wouldn't see her again until I was 12 years old.

I was 9 years old when I had my first beer. I remember thinking, this is what I've been missing. It enabled me to come out of my shell, it made me feel good about myself for once in my life. My dad would get a kick outta me taking beers out of the fridge.

By the time I was 13 I was a black out drunk. I would steal bottles of liquor from the grocery store and skip school to hang out in abandoned buildings. It was about this time that I began using marijuana and breaking into cars. My alcohol and drug use grew worse

and worse. It ruined relationship after relationship. It ruined my career in the Army. It only brought devastation on myself and those around me. By the time I was 29 I was a full blown Meth addict. I was using needles and committing burglaries on a nightly basis to keep up with my habit.

I was a miserable mess. I remember hearing the enemy telling me to load up a fatal dose. It'll be over quick. Nobody wants you around anyway. I was living in a trailer at the time, no water, no electric, no gas.

It was winter, January 29 2017. As I lie on the floor buried under dirty clothes attempting to stay warm. I did what I should have done long before. I cried out to Jesus. I said, Jesus I can't go on like this. I need your help. I can't quit this alone. Jesus, if you'll get me clean and give me another chance, i will live for you for the rest of my life.

I fell asleep that night believing everything was going to be ok. The very next day I was arrested for felony theft and drug possession, but as i sat in the back of that police cruiser a sense of peace rushed over me. I knew that it was over. I knew God was going to use this to get me clean.

In jail I found that I had an insatiable taste for the word. I could not get enough. I read every bit of Christian literature I could get my hands on. Including reading the bible front to back. God took the desire to use completely away.

As I was coming up on my release date, I learned about Jesus Is The Way Prison Ministry In Rantoul Illinois. A place for Christian Men coming out of prison to have a fighting chance at a real fresh start. Jesus Is The Way Prison Ministry prevented me from being paroled back to my hometown

where I was nearly lost to drug addiction.

I'm so very grateful for this ministry and the work its doing. Today Im over 5 years sober. I have a relationship with my 12 year old daughter. Im learning to be an Auto Body Technician. The family that disowned me is now proud of me. And Im proud to say that Im on the Board Of Directors at Jesus Is The Way Prison Ministry. I also serve as Northern Illinois State Rep. for Celebrate Recovery Inside, helping to take Gods healing back into the prisons and jails. I remember the deal I made with God. And I have every intention on keeping my word.

The victory of the Cuban military over would-be liberators funded by the United States enhanced support of Cuba's nascent government. Political opposition to Fidel Castro faded. Cubans rallied in victory by volunteering to cut cane and joined the Cuban military to defend against future invasions. The stage was set for the Cuban Missile Crisis of 1962.


English as Second Language News






