


Our Church Home

What Can I Do?



As a Matthew 25 congregation we strive to do what we can to dismantle structural racism. We learn about our history, understand who we are and we pray for change. But then we ask, "But, what can I do?" Your Compassion, Peace, and Justice Ministry Team (CPJMT) has suggestions. One to consider is supporting local businesses owned by people of color.

Previously we recommended La Mixteca. Now we suggest a second food business owned by Mauricio Contreras also located at 510 N. Cunningham Ave hidden behind Walgreens. El Patio is a Mexican ice cream parlor serving many flavors of both milk and water based frozen desserts. Products are blended on site with most ingredients purchased in Chicago. Popular are water-based flavors mango, guava and watermelon.

Some milk-based favorites are strawberries and cream and gansito.

Children often choose bubble gum and Oreo flavors.

There are a few seats both indoors and out. Service is extraordinarily friendly. Trip Advisor gives El Patio a five-star rating.

Caring for others requires self-awareness. I saw this floating around and thought it worth sharing:

- If I get dementia, I want my friends and family to embrace my reality. If I think my spouse is still alive, or if I think we're visiting my parents for dinner, let me believe those things. I'll be much happier for it.
- If I get dementia, don't argue with me about what is true for me versus what is true for you.
- If I get dementia, and I am not sure who you are, do not take it personally. My timeline is confusing to me.

- If I get dementia, and can no longer use utensils, do not start feeding me. Instead, switch me to a finger-food diet, and see if I can still feed myself.
- If I get dementia, and I am sad or anxious, hold my hand and listen. Do not tell me that my feelings are unfounded.
- If I get dementia, I don't want to be treated like a child. Talk to me like the adult that I am.
- If I get dementia, I still want to enjoy the things that I've always enjoyed. Help me find a way to exercise, read, and visit with friends.
- If I get dementia, ask me to tell you a story from my past.
- If I get dementia, and I become agitated, take the time to figure out what is bothering me.
- If I get dementia, treat me the way that you would want to be treated.
- If I get dementia, make sure that there are plenty of snacks for me in the house. Even know if I don't eat I get angry, and if I have dementia, I may have trouble explaining what I need.
- If I get dementia, don't talk about me as if I'm not in the room.
- If I get dementia, don't feel guilty if you cannot care for me 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. It's not your fault, and you've done your best. Find someone who can help you, or choose a great new place for me to live.
- If I get dementia, and I live in a dementia care community, please visit me often.
- If I get dementia, don't act frustrated if I mix up names, events, or places. Take a deep breath. It's not my fault.
- If I get dementia, make sure I always have my favorite music playing within earshot.
- If I get dementia, and I like to pick up items and carry them around, help me return those items to their original place.
- If I get dementia, don't exclude me from parties and family gatherings.
- If I get dementia, know that I still like receiving hugs or handshakes.
- If I get dementia, remember that I am still the person you know and love.

The Heart of Mission

Kemmerer Village Serves Children and Youth

Hidden in the cornfields of the Illinois prairie twenty-eight miles south of Decatur is a remarkable Presbyterian ministry called Kemmerer Village.



Since 1914 this Christian campus has served children who are unable to thrive in their biological families and traditional schools. Children and youth ages 12-18 receive residential care with a full range of educational and therapeutic services including equine therapy, athletics, and outdoor recreation at summer camp. The village chapel offers regular worship. Foster care is also provided to hundreds of additional young people.

Kemmerer partners with the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS) and local public schools as well as Camp Carew in Makanda, Illinois.

On june 7, nine from our congregation visited Kemmerer Village. Jean René Balekita offered an interactive concert inviting residents to come to the front of the chapel and try out his drums. Staff provided lunch and a guided tour of the campus. Kemmerer Village is a ministry of the Synod of Lincoln Trails of which our congregation is a member.

Dr. William C. Rose was a famous biochemist and nutritionist, known for his work on amino acids. He was also a long-time member of


FPCC who died in 1985 at the age of 98, leaving money for landscape and grounds around the church he loved.

Cool Your Cubes...Raindrop Offering this July

We are focusing on our local mission partner, Salt and Light, whose coolers are aging out. These coolers were used when Salt and Light moved into the Urbana location over 8 years ago. In order for them to do the ministry they do so well, these coolers in the Urbana grocery store will need replacing.

Community Mission Deacons is inviting First Presbyterian Church to participate in their campaign to replace the coolers.

As you may remember Salt and Light is a ministry of relationship helping people gain access to food, clothing and house-hold goods through community, dignity and respect. It collects used items for resale. It operates a grocery story through volunteer hours allowing people to gain credits to purchase food and gain work experience. And, it is a regular grocery store we can all shop at allowing the store to support those who need to gain credits. It is a ministry that helps people with other resources as well from assisting with tax preparation to developing computer skills.

The coolers needing replacement will cost Salt and Light \$416,356. The cost of the refrigeration portion is \$359,221. The electrical work to install the needed components is \$51,035. And, the monitoring, training and support will cost \$6,100.

New coolers will

- · continue low cost food, clothing and housewares for the community
- · continue to provide jobs and job training for the community
- · help the environment through upgrades

On July 9-23, see the bulletin board in Westminster Hall to purchase a frozen raindrop; yes, an ice cube! Different amounts will help fill the freezer full. We will show the amount raised on the thermometer on the outside of the freezer.

Let's try to raise \$5000 or even \$10,000 or more for this very important mission partner's need.

Face to Face with Dave and Mary Lou Bauer



What brought you to First

Presbyterian Church?

First a story. Dave's parents met at a First Presbyterian church summer picnic. They married the following summer, August 13, 1913, and gave the church pastor a \$13 honorarium! Both sets of our parents were members here and so were we. After we married, we lived in three different Midwest states. Near retirement we stopped in Champaign on our way to Florida. We worshiped at First Pres with Mary's brother Stan Bush and recognized a number of people from our childhood years. After moving to Champaign in October 2002, we again worshipped here in Champaign. After that first Sunday service Dick Foley invited us to the church potluck dinner that very evening...and so began our recent time at First Church.

What has been the highlight of your church experience?

Mary Lou: "I think our "mission possible" ministry experience. Dave: "It is the inquiry, reflection, learning and fellowship of small study groups. "

Tell me about your family? Your work?

We have a daughter, two sons, and four grandsons. Susan works for the State Department in foreign service in Brasilia, Brazil. Son John was a navy judge advocate general officer now living in Maryland and Charles, a former marine officer lives in St. Louis.

Mary Lou began her career as a speech and hearing teacher in public

schools and later worked in a public library and served on the city council in Winterset, Iowa. Dave taught ninth grade algebra and a business class in Leadville, Colorado. After graduating from McCormick Theological Seminary Dave pastored Presbyterian churches in Ohio, Illinois, and Iowa.

What do you do in your free time?

Mary Lou is a voracious reader who spends time in all our local libraries. "I become anxious if I do not have several books to read. Mysteries are like a box of chocolates, but I also love history, biography and children's books." Dave is an avid photographer, and, in the past, a tent camper and cyclist. Now he focuses on reading theology. Both of us enjoy traveling and visiting our families.

Who are your favorite Bible characters?

Mary Lou: "Moses had many excuses for disobeying God's plans for him; but he became a great leader, though he still had moments of willfulness.

Dave: "I like Elijah...an extraordinary, powerful, dedicated human being in service to God. Later in life he

became fearful and uncertain. Then he heard God say. "Elijah! what are you doing here! get up and go!! You still have work to do."

How can the church best be the church?

Dave: "Be understanding, loving and not judgmental." Mary Lou: "Realize that we are far from perfect. Try to be in the world but not of the world."

Financial Update

Contributions

Total May contributions: \$53.3K from plate and pledge plus \$9.3K from prepaid= \$62.6 This is \$18.4K more than last year and \$7.2 K under budget. Total contributions YTD, including prepaid pledges: \$376.4k which is \$18.5K less than last year and \$.6K over budget. At 41.7% of the year, we have 52.7% of the budgeted contributions.

Expenses

May expenses were \$82.7 K which is \$7.4 K greater than last year and equal to the budget. Expenses YTD were \$414.1K which is \$45.9K less than last year and \$.6K over budget. At 41.7% of the year, we have spent 41.7% of the budget.

Balance YTD

Revenue from all sources exceeds expenses by \$58K which is \$13.3K more than last year.

Summary of Restricted Accounts


\$24,490 was donated or allocated to various funds in May. This includes \$16,200 to the memorial fund and \$5000 to the elevator fund.


South Campus Reserves
