
And they'll know we are Christians by our love...

# **The Heart of Mission**

#### 2025 Raindrop Offering

This year, Community Mission
Deacons (CMDs) are responsible for
organizing the Raindrop offering that
the church collects each July. CMDs
decided that The Refugee Center will
be the beneficiary of the project this
year.

The Refugee Center (TRC) assists immigrants from all over the world, but is currently serving people from the following countries: Guatemala, Vietnam, China, DRC, Colombia, Mexico, Venezuela, Angola, Afghanistan, Honduras, Nicaragua and Ecuador. Languages provided inhouse are Spanish, Q'an'jobal, French, Lingala, Pashto, Dari, Vietnamese, Portuguese and Mandarin. The Center provides social services including referrals for health care and legal services, helping clients find housing, and assisting with job searches. They also accompany clients to job interviews, doctor and school appointments and other meetings requiring an interpreter. The Center has been doing this for 45 years!

Your Community Mission Deacons learned that the office of The Refugee Center is seeking funds for a security system to help keep clients and staff safe. Right now, staff does not have any way to see who is walking into the building before they are actually in the office area.

We would like to help the Center purchase the components for a security system, including security cameras for four entrances, computer monitors, and the necessary software and server to operate the system. This would be similar to the system we have here at the church.

Check out the Raindrop display in Westminster Hall. Take a raindrop with the amount you would like to donate, write a check to the church with "Raindrop" on the memo line and put your check in the offering or drop it off in the office. You can also donate online through the church's website under "DONATE" and indicate Raindrop in the comments box.

We will be collecting donations on two Sundays, July 6 and 13, and our goal is to raise \$5,000 for this security system. Please give from your heart and pray for the safety of the staff and clients at The Refugee Center.

### Taste a Bit of African Presbyterian Culture Sunday, July 13





#### **Financial Update**

#### **Contributions**

Total May contributions: \$47.3K from plate and pledge plus \$7.9K from prepaid= \$55.2K This is \$7K less than last year and \$9.9K under budget. Total contributions YTD, including prorated prepaid pledges: \$ 359.3 K which is \$4.1K less than last year and \$33.8K over budget. At 41.7% of the year, we have 53.1% of the budgeted contributions, including all prepaid contributions.

#### **Expenses**

May expenses were \$123.8 K, which is \$8.3K more than last year and \$44.8K over budget. Expenses YTD are \$441.7K, which is \$5.3K more than last year and \$46.7K over budget. At 41.7% of the year, we have spent 46.6% of the budget.


Revenue from all sources exceeded expenses by \$79.8K which is \$26.2K less than last year at the same time.


#### **Session Designated Funds**
