Chili/Dessert Cook Off Tempted the Best Appetites

During our chili cook off we got to spend a portion of our afternoon in our Centennial Hall surrounded by wonderful food and people! In total, we had about 20 chilis and about 10 desserts. This was of course more than I had mentioned in the morning, in fact multiple members pointed out that our dessert situation reminded them of the story of the loaves and fishes.

All in all we had a wonderful time with good food and even better fellowship. I already look forward to next year's cook off.

We also have the two winning recipes from this year's cook off. **Kathryn Cole's** recipe for *A Twist on Aunt Connie's Chicken Chili*, and **Sherry Marble's** *Chocolate Mousse*.

A Twist on Aunt Connie's Chicken Chili (adjusted to feed a crowd) Serves 10-12; Approx. 5-8 hours in crockpot on low

Ingredients

- 1.5-2 lb chicken breast cooked and cubed
- 8 oz jar mild-medium salsa
- 8 oz cubed pepper jack cheese
- 32 oz box chicken broth
- 1 TBS chili powder (or to taste)

- (2) 48 oz cans Great Northern beans
- 12 oz can Rotel green chilis and tomatoes
- 1/2 block cream cheese, cubed
- 1 TBS cumin
- 1/2 TBS dried oregano
- Salt and black pepper to taste (additional salt likely only needed if using reduced sodium chicken broth) **Preparation**

Combine all ingredients in a crockpot and heat on low until the cheese is melted and all ingredients are combined, approximately 5-8 hours.

Tips

If too thick, add more chicken broth. Serve with your favorite chili toppings. To scale down the recipe, omit the cream cheese and can of Rotel and halve all other ingredients. Freezes well!

Sherry's Chocolate Mousse* A mousse with a rich, sophisticated texture and a flavor that hovers near heaven.

Ingredients

18 oz semisweet chocolate (I use Ghirardelli)	2 cups heavy cream, well chilled
6 large or extra-large eggs	2 tablespoons confectioners' sugar
2 tablespoons crème de cacao	1 tablespoon vanilla extract (I use Mediterranean vanilla)

Preparation

1. Melt the chocolate over hot water.

2. While the chocolate is melting, whip the cream until it forms medium stiff peaks. Do not overbeat or the mousse will lose some of its smooth, light texture.

3. Separate 4 of the eggs and set the whites aside. Combine yolks with the 2 remaining whole eggs in the bowl of an electric mixer. Beat until eggs are thick and lemon colored, about 5-10 minutes. While the yolks are beating place the 4 egg whites in a clean copper or stainless-steel bowl and whisk, preferably by hand, until the whites start to stiffen. Sprinkle on the confectioners' sugar and beat until you have firm peaks.

4. Remove melted chocolate from water and cool just till warm. Working quickly, add the cooled melted chocolate and a scoop of the whipped cream to the egg yolks. Stir until smooth, then add the remaining cream. When it is fully incorporated, add the liqueur and vanilla, then fold in the whites until just blended.

5. This mousse can be poured into individual serving dishes or into 1 larger dessert dish. Chill at least 4 hours before serving (chilling it overnight intensifies the flavor). The mousse can be frozen for up to two weeks. Remove from the freezer and let it sit in the refrigerator overnight before serving.

Financial Update

Contributions

Total January contributions: \$74.8K from plate and pledge plus \$10.3K from prepaid= \$85.1K. This is \$2.3 K more than last year and \$19.7K over budget. Total contributions YTD, including prorated prepaid pledges: This is the same as the amounts for January. At 8.3% of the year, we have 25.3% of the budgeted contributions, including all prepaid contributions.

Expenses

January expenses were \$70.1 K, which is \$9.2 K more than last year and \$9.6K under budget. Expenses YTD were the same as January's. At 8.3% of the year, we have spent 7.3% of the budget.

Balance YTD

Revenue, including prepaid, exceeded expenses by \$131.6K which is 2.3K less than last year at the same time.

Session Designated Funds

\$1,613,224 which is \$31,221 less than last month.

Summary of Restricted Accounts

The elevator fund received \$2250 this month.
