These stories are important to our faith journey and our identity as followers of Jesus. And yet we often move too quickly from Palm Sunday to Easter Sunday with little time to take in the dramatic story of that last week.

How might taking a closer look at the ancient story open us to deeper conviction for our role in its ongoing message?

Maundy Thursday – Thursday, April 17, 5 PM





Prayer for the Refugee

God of the journey, We remember that Mary and Joseph Had to flee to Egypt, Taking Jesus to safety, Leaving home behind. Remembering, We pray for sisters and brothers Around your world Who are forced to leave their homes. We pray for brothers and sisters who are Driven from home by natural disasters. We pray for sisters and brothers who are Driven from unnatural acts of violence and persecution. We pray for brothers and sisters who are Driven from home because of inadequate responses to natural events. We pray for those who leave their countries and cross borders. We pray for those who are internally displaced. Finding new places to live within their own country. We pray for those who are exposed to freezing cold and searing heat, Those who lack food, water, shelter, and other necessities of life, Those who are exploited, violated, and abused, and Those who mourn the loss of place and all that brings. We give thanks for the strength, courage, and grace of our sisters and brothers Who are refugees or internally displaced. We give thanks for the contributions they make in their new places And for the ways in which they enrich our lives. Guide the leaders of the world to find creative ways to respond, To extend protection and provide safe haven, To care compassionately and respectfully for the needs of our sisters and brothers, To address the situations and circumstances that force people to leave their homes. To do justice and to seek peace. Show us ways that we can support our brothers and sisters whom we encounter. Inspire us to engage in the efforts to create a world In which all have a safe place to call home. We pray in the name of the refugee Jesus, Amen.

Welcoming the Stranger

Welcoming the stranger (the immigrant we would say today) is the most often repeated commandment in the Hebrew Scriptures, except for the imperative to worship only one God. And the love of neighbor (especially the most vulnerable neighbor) is doubtlessly the New Testament's constant command... Whatever the cause of immigration today, there can be no doubt as to where the church must stand when it comes to defending the immigrant. Theologian Orlando O. Espín.

In the 1960s First Pres nurtured two Vietnamese families and more recently we collaborated with The Refugee Center to host two Congolese families. All these of our brothers and sisters continue to be faithful, productive citizens of our nation.

Our Presbyterian Disaster Assistance produced this <u>17 minute</u> <u>video</u> sharing the story of a refugee family from Syria welcomed by Chevy Chase Presbyterian Church in Washington, DC.

"When a foreigner resides among you in your land, do not mistreat them. The foreigner residing among you must be treated as your nativeborn. Love them as yourself, for you were foreigners in Egypt. I am the LORD your God." *Leviticus* 19:33-34

Economic Blackout Day, DEI, The Bible & the PCUSA

Financial Update

Contributions

Total January contributions: \$73.2K from plate and pledge plus \$7.9K from prepaid= \$81.1K This is \$4K less than last year and \$16K over budget. Total contributions YTD, including prorated prepaid pledges: \$81.1 K which is \$4K less than last year and \$16K over budget. At 8.3% of the year, we have 19.4% of the budgeted contributions, including all prepaid contributions.

Expenses

January expenses were \$64.9 K, which is \$5.2K less than last year and \$14.1K under budget. Expenses YTD are \$64.9K, which is \$5.2K less than last year and \$14.4K under budget. At 8.3% of the year, we have spent 6.9% of the budget.

Balance YTD


Revenue from all sources exceeded expenses \$104.5K which is \$26.2K less than last year at the same time.


Session Designated Funds


\$1,223,237 which is \$88,295 less than last month.

Tropical Vacation Bundt Cake (More recipes to come in April...)

Ingredients:

8-ounce can crushed pineapple, drained and juice reserved

2 cups coconut flakes

1/4 cup all-purpose flour

4 large eggs

1/2 cup vegetable oil

1/2 cup pineapple juice (from the can of crushed pineapple)

8-ounce (by weight) tub of sour cream (I used Knudsen.)

1 teaspoon pineapple extract (if you can't find it, use vanilla extract instead)

1 teaspoon coconut extract (if you can't find it, use vanilla extract instead)

1 box spiced cake mix, the kind that makes a 9-inch by 13-inch cake or a 2-layer cake (I used Duncan Hines Spice Cake.)

5.1-ounce package of DRY instant coconut cream pudding and pie filling (I used Jell-O)

5.1-ounce package of DRY instant banana cream pudding mix (I used Jell-O)

12-ounce (by weight) bag of white chocolate or vanilla baking chips (11-ounce package will do, too -- I used Nestle.)

You'll need a Bundt Pan that has been sprayed with Pam or another nonstick cooking spray and then floured

To Make the Cake Batter:

Drain the crushed pineapple and reserve the juice in the bowl. Measure out a 1/2 cup of the crushed pineapple juice. If you don't have enough in the bowl, use canned pineapple juice to make up the difference. Set aside.

Measure out 2 cups of coconut flakes (pressing them down in the measuring cup). Set aside.

Place HALF of the flour in the bottom of a food processor with the steel blade attached.

Scatter the coconut flakes over the flour.

Sprinkle the second HALF of the flour over the top of the coconut flakes and process, using an on-and-off motion, until the coconut flakes have been chopped into much smaller pieces.

Crack the eggs into the bowl of an electric mixer. Mix them up on LOW speed until they uniform in color.

Pour in half-cup vegetable oil and mix it in with the eggs on LOW speed.

Add the half-cup of pineapple juice and mix it in at LOW speed.

Scoop out the cup of sour cream and add it to your bowl. Mix that in on LOW speed.

Add the pineapple to your mixing bowl. Mix that in on LOW speed.

Add the flour and chopped coconut flakes mixture to your bowl. Mix them in at LOW speed.

Add the teaspoon of pineapple extract and the teaspoon of coconut extract. Mix those in at LOW speed. Continue to mix until everything is well combined.

Sprinkle HALF the box of dry cake mix on top of the ingredients in the mixer bowl. (You don't have to be exact -- just quesstimate.)

Turn the mixer on LOW speed and mix until everything is well combined.

Sprinkle in the rest of the dry cake mix. Mix that in on LOW speed.

Add DRY coconut cream pudding and pie filling. Sprinkle it on top and mix it in on LOW speed.

Add DRY banana cream pudding and pie filling. Sprinkle it on top and mix it in on LOW speed.

Sprinkle the white chocolate or vanilla baking chips on top and stir them in by hand.

Use the rubber spatula to transfer the cake batter to the Bundt pan you prepared.

Bake your cake at 350 degrees F. for 55 minutes.

Test it for doneness by inserting a cake tester, thin wooden skewer, or long toothpick. Insert it midway between the outside edges of the pan and the metal protrusion that makes the crater in the center of the pan.

If the tester comes out clean, your cake is done. If there is still unbaked batter clinging to the tester, shut the oven door and bake your cake in 5-minute increments until the tester comes out clean.

Once done, take it out of the oven and let it cool in the pan for 20 minutes and then pull the sides away from the pan. Tip the Bundt pan upside down on a platter

Cover your Tropical Vacation Bundt Cake loosely with foil and refrigerate it for at least one hour. (Overnight is even better). This cake is very rich. If you don't want to frost it, an alternative is to sprinkle it with powdered sugar and call it good. You can also dot it with sweetened whipped cream and decorate with seasonal fruits. Strawberries cut in half and raspberries are pretty on top of the whipped cream, and so are peach slices. If you like, you can get more exotic and decorate with mango, papaya, and kiwi and/or nuts.
