
This conversation will be one way we can think about and thank all of our Veterans. Remember, Veterans Day is Thursday, November 11th.

Darkness

'The woods are lovely, dark and deep'
Stopping by woods
on a snowy evening (Robert Frost)

Philosophers and the like ponder the lasting impact of events that at the time may seem insignificant. Some turn out to be game changers. Theologian Karl Barth's granddaughter reportedly asked: 'Grandpa, why are there trees instead of no trees?' *Good one, Gramps.* Out of the mouths of babes.

Present at the creation

Why indeed is there something instead of nothing? Genesis reports that in the beginning, 'God created the heavens and the earth' (1:1) Out of nothing, something. The text then continues, 'Darkness was upon the face of the deep'. (1:2) Some commentators (see for example, The New Jerusalem Bible) note that the text does **not say that God created the darkness.**

Here we are, on a pleasant day. Minding our own business. Or trying to. Then darkness. The verse seems to simply throw in this major pronouncement, for no extra charge, as it were. God did not create darkness. It was there. Part of the deal. Present at the creation.

Why, God, why?

Down through the ages we have struggled with a great mystery of life. Darkness. Often unannounced. In the 1800's, Horatio Spafford, a prominent Chicago Presbyterian elder, suffered a devastating loss when his four daughters were drowned at sea. Spafford penned these words:

..Lord, hasten the day when my faith shall be sight The clouds be rolled back as a scroll.. (It is well with my soul, Spafford)

Some ancients represented death as a ghostly figure perilously brandishing a massive scythe. We are often caught off guard. When the scythe encounters a grandparent, or parent, as grievous as that is, there does seem to be something rational about end of life. The scythe then strikes a spouse. A teenager is killed in a highway accident. A young child is diagnosed with a terminal disease. A beloved partner. An unspeakably precious child. An irreplaceable childhood friend. We are stopped breathless in our tracks. 'Where are you God when we most need you?' Darkness. 'Why God, why?

A eulogy for Alex

William Sloane Coffin was senior minister at Riverside Church in New York City. His twenty four year old son, Alex, was killed when in a storm when he drove his car off a bridge. Dr. Coffin then preached, 'A Eulogy for Alex'. (The sermon is available in such sources as www.beliefnet.com).

In summary, Coffin's message was, 'Please do not try to console us in our grief by saying that Alex's death was God's will'.

He continued, When a person dies, there are many things that can be said, and there is at least one thing that should never be said. ... "I just don't understand the will of God." For some reason, nothing so infuriates me as the incapacity of seemingly intelligent people to get it through their heads that God doesn't go around this world with his fingers on triggers, his fists around knives, his hands on steering wheels. God is dead set against all unnatural deaths.

Maybe the best form of condolence is to simply be there. As St. Francis of Assisi has advised, "Preach the gospel at all times. And if necessary use words'. Darkness on the face of the deep..

A contemporary doxology

It was Sunday morning at Westminster Presbyterian Church in downtown Minneapolis. A Rabbi from a local synagogue spoke about the Holy Spirit. He mentioned key passages from what we call the Old Testament such as: 'The Lord God formed man from the dust of the ground and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life'... (Gen 2:7); or, 'When the people saw Moses' shining visage he (Moses) covered his face with a veil' (Exodus 34:33). The Rabbi concluded unceremoniously with a recording of Leonard Cohen's Hallelujah.

There's a blaze of light in every word It doesn't matter which you heard The holy or the broken Hallelujah (Cohen)

The church hall remained in holy silence.

The Grim Reaper

Jeff Buckley's rendition of Cohen's Hallelujah resonates with the advent of the Grim Reaper. The youthful singer was drowned in a swimming accident. My imagination might be working overtime, but I find his presentation riddled with terrifying premonition. Maybe irrationally, as I hear Jeff sing, he seems to be in dreadful anticipation of his own death. The Grim Reaper, scythe poised, approaches unrelentingly on the Mississippi. Darkness upon the face of the deep.

Finance

Financial Update

Contributions

Contributions in October to the Operating Fund were \$21.4K less than in 2020 but \$20.4K more than the budget at \$91.5K. The Year to Date total is above last year by \$4.1K but below the budgeted amount by \$3.8K. These figures include prepaid pledges (those paid in the year prior to the budget year) that are prorated over the year with 1/12 added to each month's contributions. Including all revenue sources, at 83% through the year we have received 88% of the expected year's revenue.

Expenses

Year to Date expenses are \$27.5K above the budget at \$899.5K and more than in 2020 by \$71.4K. At 83% through the year we have experienced 86% of the expected year's expenses.

Balance

Considering all sources, revenue exceeds expenses by \$60.0K which is \$82.5K less than at the end of October in 2020.

Restricted Funds


In addition to contributions to the operating fund there was \$4,752 donated last month to special offerings and funds restricted to specific purposes such as missions supported by our church.


Stewardship



Ministry With Vulnerable Children

This is the Raindrop Project which we help sponsor several years ago *Ministry with Vulnerable Children*. The following comes from **Jeff and Kristi Boyd**.

Last year, I reported on the envisioning and development of a new de-centered approach for the Presbyterian ministry for vulnerable children in East Kasai. These plans are now being rolled out.

Through host families, Presbyterian congregations have started to welcome and care for at-risk children while their biological family is traced back and a reunion mediated. The church seeks to sponsor these children's education throughout elementary and secondary school.

Congregations are further becoming child advocates to prevent and denounce neglect or abuse in the local community. The shift renders the

ministry more sustainable and child friendly. It prevents child abandonment and helps more children find a home.

The reorganization is not possible without training the congregations. Thanks to gifts from PC(USA) churches and individuals like yours, we have already accomplished trainings for 99 congregations in the first two Synods. Next month there will be the training for 51 congregations in the third synod, and any new gifts will go towards the training for another 42 congregations in the fourth and final Synod of East Kasai.

At the beginning of the 2021-2022 school year, this month, over 175 children will receive a school kit for them to be at an equal footing with their peers. The accompanied children are all officially recognized and documented by the State Social Services as vulnerable children.

Convinced by the work in East Kasai, the national Presbyterian leaders are now seeking a similar shift for West Kasaï, where the Church's headquarters are located.

Because we are not allowed to travel, our accompaniment of this shift has happened through WhatsApp, e-mail, telephone and zoom to prepare this overhaul.

The Republic of Cuba

Cuban Wars for Independence From Spain The Ten Years' War 1868-1878 By Bob Kirby, Cuba Partners RWK3213@GMAIL.COM

Cuba Libre (Free Cuba), the struggle for independence from Spain, was fed by the islands' economic elites hungry for control of their political and economic future. War opened a path for the United States to gain increasing economic, political and cultural influence.

Creole, Carlos Manuel de Céspedes proclaimed independence in 1868 listing grievances of taxation without representation, corruption, lack of religious freedom, suppression of the press and denial of rights of petition and assembly. The movement developed in eastern Cuba (Oriente) where farms were smaller and wealth less. The rebel leadership was divided on the issue of slavery, slowing the direct intervention of the US. However Cuban exiles in the US supported the rebel government with weapons, supplies and money. Spain controlled the

seas and maintained a large ground presence forcing the rebels into protracted guerilla warfare that ended in 1878. An ineffective "little war" initiated by rebels who had fled to the US lasted just two years ending in 1880. Spain prevailed.

The "Ten Years' War" was followed by the collapse of the sugar industry. The Spanish government seized the property of separatists. Wealth was increasingly in the hands of fewer Cubans and more and more US investors who built miles of private railroads with cheap US steel. Investors bought up bottom priced sugar and tobacco plantations and the era of the Cuban landed aristocracy declined. Nationalism rose including the appearance of the first Cuban flag and the text that would become the Cuban national anthem. By 1894 eighty-seven percent of Cuba's exports and 40 percent of imports were with the US.
