The response to Styrofoam collection at church has been over the top; so much has been saved from landfills—Hurrah! All donations have been taken to DART in Urbana to be compressed and recycled into other products.

However, DART closed at the end of September, and other such receivers are not near C-U.

Another approach is to encourage restaurants to use cardboard instead of Styrofoam for takeout; do you

know of any, such as Harvest Market or Blues that do this? Each of us can carry a reusable container for leftovers. Make your wishes known to managements, so that the use of Styrofoam decreases. And contact legislators—Paul Faraci and Carol Ammons—to support a state-wide ban on Styrofoam containers. Grass roots movements make a difference.

#### **Marion Medical Mission**

One of our mission partners that is located here in Illinois and helps people in Africa is Marion Medical Mission. Our Presbytery is proud to support their work as well. You can read about its beginnings, its founder and what it is doing today in Africa on its website www.mmmwater.org/ our-story. Its founder Tom Logan, the son of a Presbyterian minister, is from Marion. Illinois. Marion Medical Mission began in 1985 to support medical missionaries in the Democratic Republic of Congo and moved over to work in Malawi in 1990. Its goal is to provide safe drinking water by building wells. Many medical problems that were occurring were solved with safe drinking water. MMM builds more than 3000 wells every year. During the pandemic, the African leadership carried on that work without the volunteer support that it had received from the United States. MMM has operated over 35 years "in obedience to God's call to love your neighbor as yourself."

#### Where did I see God?

Once again, I was in Zambia, staying in the towns of Lundazi & Chipata. There would be days of driving over 2 hours before getting to the first well. My partner and I drove nearly 1,800 miles, and completed 96 wells. As a result, over 2,400 households now have clean water, serving over 24,000 people!

#### Where was God?

- Outside of Chipata, the villages were set in open plains with the mountains in the background. How beautiful.
- Villages' gardens, so green, often next to the new wells
- Women singing with wonderful harmony at the wells
- Villages excitement (especially children) when the truck would arrive
- Willingness of the villagers to help carry the hand pump parts to the well
- Children shouting muzungu (white person)

Children wanting to hold hands with muzungu walking to/from the wells - The excitement of all the people trying to get a taste of the clean water from the new well

- Words cannot describe the feeling one has when you see clean water coming from a new well after walking by open contaminated water holes.

#### Where was God?

God was everywhere!

MMM has asked for the following prayers:

- •Please pray for all the African leaders and workers.
- •Pray for the mission team volunteers that go to work side by side with them.
- •Pray God protects all MMM staff and volunteers from any physical harm or injury. May God keep them from all sickness and disease.

- Pray that God will provide workers
  with all the physical resources they
  need to accomplish their mission and
  work mightily to remove any obstacles
  that may arise.
- •Pray for the villages that will receive the wells and that God will prosper them through their clean, safe water. Ask God to bless their labors making bricks and collecting stones. Pray God will guide the village leadership and the well committee.
- Pray for safety in travels, both for safe flight to and from Africa and for traveling mercies while in Africa. May God watch over all MMM workers as they travel year round.
- •Pray that God will open the hearts of many to provide the financial resources necessary for this mission. May the satisfaction of having made a difference and the joy of generosity bless them.

### What brought you to First Presbyterian Church?

#### Tell me about your work?

Andrew is a PhD candidate in German at the U of I where he studies the culture of the Protestant Reformation. Libby is an ecologist and works in a greenhouse on campus. Libby's graduate degree is in environmental

conservation. Her current research is on carbon sequestration. That means moving carbon from the atmosphere to plants to fungi then back to the soil. Libby is from Moorhead, MN and Andrew is from Morton, IL.

#### Snippets from Your Pastor

How did October arrive so quickly? Rachel and I went to a ministry conference in late August and learned about transitional ministry. During worship here we celebrated Immigrant Welcome Week and Cuba Sunday. Then we attended our son's wedding in Charlotte a few weeks ago. And now World Communion Sunday (October 1st) is upon us.

"All things on earth point home in old October," wrote Thomas Wolfe. "Sailors to sea, travelers to walls and fences, hunters to field and hollow and the long voice of the hounds, the lover to the love he has forsaken." October is home coming month.

October is a time I always associate with stewardship as this is the season we often hear from friends in the church about why they give of their time, talent, and treasure to the church. This "stewardship season" reminds us that we are called to be year-long Christian philanthropists, harnessing everything entrusted to our care to the glory of God and to the service of neighbor. I like this season because it asks of me where does the rubber of my life hit the theological road?

October is also a time I associate with thinking more widely about the world. The short essay below, which you've probably read before, illustrates how our church's relationship with the Luyano congregation in Havana has changed my idea of the word "world."

As I write this, I am eager to host our mission partners Bob and Kristi Rice from South Sudan. The world is a big place, and we're called to be in relationship with brothers and sisters everywhere.

October points to home.

During this season, I pull out my sweaters. I put away short pants and my brand-new seersucker suit. Some of the outdoor plants will come into the den. We start finalizing plans for Thanksgiving and Christmas gatherings of our faraway sons, significant others, and, now, a new daughter-in-law. We hope our football team wins. We put together Christmas lists. The quiet of night falls sooner and sooner. The sun is reluctant to arise, and, increasingly, so am I.

I like this season and look forward to the gifts it will bring to our congregation. A clarinet concert, the Western Illinois University choir is coming, special offerings for adult Sunday school, are all on our horizon. This is a new chapter for everybody. We're on this journey together.

### A Cuba memory for our church trip in 2019:

We piled onto the bus—our rickety, old friend—for a 30-minute drive to Santa Maria del Mar. Our Cuban hosts were taking us to the beach! Robert was the first soul into the ocean. I was the last. We bobbed around as white as

fish bellies in bright swim trunks. The deeper water was blue. At the beach, turquoise waves broke into pearl foam. Midway between the beach and the horizon the blues blended into a color I cannot describe, and in midwinter could hardly believe.

Katerine and Norka were our hosts. At the Restaurante Costarenas a hundred yards from the beach, we sat outdoors beneath a high tarp. Katerine. Robert, and I ordered cervezas nacionale. Norka ordered a coke. Judi and Rachel ordered rum and cokes; when the drinks appeared with ice in them, they became immediately alarmed and asked the waiter to take the ice out: nothing poses as egregious a threat to intestinal health as a cube of local ice. Amiably, he returned the drinks sans ice but with more rum. Soon, Judi and Rachel were laughing loudly and talking with their hands like native Cubans.

I used Judi's Spanish-English dictionary to shape nonsense sentences, which amused Norka and Katerine. I liked hearing them laugh and watching their faces twist up with delighted smiles. "I stamp (sellar) a jungle (selva) with a traffic light (semaforo)." They didn't know what I was talking about and nobody cared. The laughter seemed meaningful enough.

Towards the end of lunch two men approached with congas and a nylon stringed guitar. They regaled us with an impromptu concert. Nothing quickens one's pulse like music, especially music well-played, as this was. Spanish speakers in the small

crowd of diners—there were maybe ten of them-laughed at the same times. Those of us who didn't speak Spanish missed the joke, and I told Katrina when we walked to the van later that I wondered if the singers had been making fun of us gringos. On the contrary, she said. They were singing about America. I blushed with shame.

On the way back to the church, jostling in the van, I pondered how I'll never be able to utter the word "world" from the pulpit ever again without thinking differently.

Thank you, Cuba.

#### **Financial Update**

#### **Contributions**

Total August contributions: \$29K from plate and pledge plus \$9.3K from prepaid= \$38.3K This is \$3.7 K less than last year and \$31.5K under budget. Total contributions YTD, including prorated prepaid pledges: \$554.2K which is \$32.3K less than last year and \$4.2K under budget. At 66.7% of the year, we have 70.6% of the budgeted contributions, including all prepaid contributions.

#### **Expenses**

August expenses were \$59.6 K, which is \$11.4 K less than last year and \$23.1K under budget. Expenses YTD were \$636.7K, which is \$56K less than last year and \$24.9K under budget. At 66.7% of the year, we have spent 64.1% of the budget.

#### **Balance YTD**

Revenue from all sources exceeds expenses by \$12K, which is \$8.4K more than last year.


#### **Session Designated Funds**


\$1,750.079 which is \$93,989 less than last month.
