# We Choose Welcome



#### Update from Building & Grounds By Tom Ulen, Chair

Your Building & Grounds Committee has been working on several important projects that we want to tell you about.

First, you may have noticed that an automobile accident damaged the brick column and founding stone at the NE corner of our property (on the SW corner of State and Hill). We are having the column and stone restored, and we may take the opportunity to put additional wording to the identifying information on the column.

Second, there is progress on the installation of the new elevator. We solicited bids for the construction of the new hoistway for the elevator. Last Friday we opened and considered those bids and awarded the contract to Petry-Kuhne. We're not yet sure when they will begin their work, but once begun, it is likely to take 90 days before they can turn the shaft over to Koné for the installaion of the new elevator. Then, Petry-Kuhne contemplates another 30 days to finish their portion of the work.

The good news is that we're moving forward with trusted and skilled contractors. The unfortunate news is that the installation of the new hoistway is going to be much more expensive than we had anticipated and that it is going to take longer to complete than we had hoped. In the event of another end-of-year miracle, the project may be substantially completed by Christmas. But more likely, the new elevator will be ready early in January, 2025. Thank you all for your patience through the last year. The wait, we are sure, will be worth it.

Third, we are having a new roof installed on the Sanctuary Building by Butler Roofing. The work should take only about five working days and is likely to be completed by mid-September. The new slategreen shingles should last at least 40 years. In addition to putting down the shingles, Brad Passalacqua and his crew will fix some leaks that we have discovered and will put special wire mesh behind the louvers on the north and south steeples to prevent bat infestation, which is a problem for all open buildings in the downtown area. Shortly after the completion of the new roof, we are going to have solar panels installed on the south- and west-facing portions of the roof. Route 66 Solar will be doing the installation. Through the miracle of government subsidization, the installation cost will be reduced by 63 percent if completed and fully functional by December 13, 2024, which, we are assured, it will be. Roughly speaking, the government checks we shall receive will reduce the installation costs from almost \$200,000 to about \$74,000.

Once the solar panels are up and running, it is likely that we will become a "net zero" consumer of electricity very quickly. That means that the panels will be generating enough power to satisfy all our needs so that we will not need to purchase any additional power from Ameren. Indeed, it is not inconceivable that we will generate power in excess of our needs and will sell that power back to Ameren. Route 66 Solar calculated that we will be saving approximately \$16,500 per year and that, therefore, we'll recoup the entire installation cost in about four years.

Finally, we are trying to make use of the Christian Education Building in such a way as to further God's plans for us to help to make this a better world. To that end, we are talking with Tracy Dace's DREAAM program about sharing the use of the building.

Although our negotiations have some hurdles to get over, we have a reasonably good idea of the general shape of our joint use of the building. The Church's offices will continue to be in the NE corner of the first floor. Tracy and the DREAAM program will have their offices on the second floor and will use the rooms on the first, second, and third floors and the gym. There will be a separate buzzer entrance into the CEB for Church and for DREAAM business.

The current users of the CEB – the English Language Learners, the GROW program, and the Saturday night Francophone service in the Chapel – will all continue as they are. (DREAAM's usage of their portions of the building will typically occur after 3 PM. Our usages typically end at 2 PM.) We will keep you posted on all these projects.

# English Language Learners (ELL)

The ELL program began a new semester on August 26<sup>th</sup>. We had a full house and lots of energy and chaos as we sorted name tags, got to know each other, and got everyone to their appropriate classroom! We currently have 83 students enrolled, though not all come every day. We have begun a waiting list in earnest.

We have 10 new students from Kazakhstan. There are 100 visiting scholars here as part of their government's special program.

There are more than 200 Kazakhs in Champaign Urbana, because most of the scholars brought their entire families. The majority of the scholars are women, and their husbands are tagging along, most with a low level of English. What a privilege to meet folks from a part of the world that many of us know nothing about!

We are excited to partner with the church for the Welcoming Week game night on September 17<sup>th</sup>. I plan to encourage many of our students to attend. I hope many from First Pres will take advantage of this opportunity to meet people from around the world. I am excited to see what this year holds!!

# Christian Girls' Higher Secondary School Sangla Hill

The town of Sangla Hill is in the western part of Sheikhupura, Punjab. Christian Girls' Higher Secondary School (CGHSS) Sangla Hill is located adjacent to a beautiful hill outside the town. The school and boarding house were first established in 1902, by the Women's Foreign Missionary Society of the United Presbyterian Church of America. In 1972, the school was nationalized and later in 1998, the school was denationalized and returned to The Presbyterian Education Board (PEB) in deplorable condition. Immediately, repair work was started and a new boarding house was later constructed, thanks to the generous grant from the Presbyterian Woman's Birthday Offering. The high school was built in two phases; in 2005 and 2007. CGHSS Sangla Hill is proud to have been upgraded to a higher secondary school in 2012.

# Fall Volunteer Opportunities at Salt & Light

With our updated vocational program launching, there are several new opportunities to get involved at Salt & Light right now. If you have questions or would like to participate in any of these ways, please reach out to Vocational Program Coordinator **Gwenna Pelz**, at 217.355.5654 or <u>gpelz@saltandlightministry.org</u>.

#### <u>Allies</u>

Our program participants will now be meeting once or twice a month in small Affinity Groups that are facilitated by volunteers called Allies. Allies are there to lead conversations, make connections, and provide supportive friendship. Employment Track participants are meeting in these groups with Allies now. In the spring semester, we will be starting Affinity Groups for our Enrichment Track participants who are outside the traditional workforce, including seniors, individuals with physical or developmental disabilities, and those who may be new to the United States and not be legally able to work. We'd like to start conversations now with volunteers who might be interested in serving as Allies with these groups after the first of the year.

#### **Course Allies**

All our participants, both Employment and Enrichment Track, will have the opportunity to attend educational classes. Required classes for Employment Track participants will include Work Life and Faith & Finances, and elective classes for all participants will be more varied, with options like ESL, Bible studies, healthcare, and other possibilities. While Ally volunteers will meet with participants as background support through all their engagement in the program, Course Allies are volunteers who choose to attend a class as supportive co-participants. The first classes for the fall semester, Work Life and I'M Well (a mindfulness and meditation program), will begin during the first week of September, with others still in the process of being scheduled, and there are openings for Course Allies in all of them.

#### **Group Meals**

Employment Track participants will be attending required weekly classes for the duration of the semester. Meals will be provided to the participants, course instructors, and Course Allies at each of these meetings. This fall, we are in need of churches or individuals to provide dinner on Wednesday evenings from September 4th to November 13th, and lunch on Thursday afternoons from September 5th to November 14th, each time at Salt & Light and for a group of 15-18 people.

#### **Course Facilitators**

For this fall and for the spring, we already have volunteers who are leading the Work Life and Faith & Finances classes. However, we need to add to our team for these two classes, so we are looking now for people who would be interested in facilitating either this soft skills job training class or the financial management class sometime next year. We're also still working to arrange facilitators for an elective class or two that we hope to offer this fall semester, including a Bible study and a discussion group course called *The After Party* (https://redeemingbabel.org/the-after-party/free-course/).

# **Financial Update**

#### Contributions

Total July contributions: \$30.3K from plate and pledge plus \$10.3K from prepaid= \$40.6K This is \$39.4K less than last year and \$24.8K under budget. Total contributions YTD, including prorated prepaid pledges: \$484.2 K which is \$31.7K less than last year and \$26.4 K over budget. At 58.3% of the year, we have 68.2% of the budgeted contributions, including all prepaid contributions.

#### Expenses

July expenses were \$70.3 K, which is \$2.3K more than last year and \$9.7K under budget. Expenses YTD are \$582K, which is \$5K more than last year and \$22K over budget. At 58.3% of the year, we have spent 60.7% of the budget.

#### **Balance YTD**


Revenue, including prepaid, exceeded expenses by \$9.5K, which is \$30.3K less than last year at the same time.


#### **Session Designated Funds**
