

The Heart of Mission October 12, 2021

We have a very close relationship with our sister church in Cuba, Iglesia Presbyteriana-Reformada Luyano. One thing we share with them is the daily devotional Su Voz. However, we have not been receiving the devotional directly to our email the last month and a half. The reason for this is complicated; the trouble had to do with the way we were receiving it. The bottom line is that Su Voz has not stopped but you will need to work a little harder to get it until I can work out the best way to have it emailed to you without it being unsubscribed so easily. Meanwhile, I'd like to point out that Monday's Su Voz was particularly relevant for us during this stewardship season. (Thank you to Bob Kirby for pointing this out to me.) I have reprinted it here:

# Monday, October 11 A GIVING GOD 1 Kings 3:3-15

If you, then, though you are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will your Father in heaven give good gifts to those who ask him? (NIV)

## Matthew 7:11

Solomon had a personal and reciprocal relation with God, as expressed in this passage through his offerings. Motivated by love, Solomon sacrificed thousands of offerings to the Lord; and that same night, God appeared to the young Solomon in a dream to give him something in exchange. And, as the text chosen for today says, "God let him choose."

Solomon's answer showed humility. As a new king who was trying to exercise his function, he felt young, not knowing what to do. Therefore, he asked for a understanding heart, which knew the difference between good and evil.

God, the great giver of gifts, was pleased with Solomon. This story demonstrates God's generosity, in that he not only gave Solomon what he asked for, but he also gave him what he asked for in abundance. Solomon came to be wiser than any other human. And God lavished additional gifts of riches and honor to Solomon. This description of God as the great giver coincides with other descriptions of generosity found in the Bible.

The great giver loves to give good gifts. Let us, then, cultivate these values of humility and genuine love in our relations with God.

**Prayer:** thank you God for your abundant generosity; I ask you that you open my eyes to see all the gifts you make for me daily, and that at times are difficult for me to see. Amen. **Translation by John Walter**

We will open our church parking lot to the children of the community for fun treats and decorations. This is a great opportunity to show Christian hospitality to our neighborhood families! However, we will not have the soup supper that normally occurs the same evening. **Donations of prepackaged individually** wrapped candies are needed. **Compassion, Peace and Justice** invites you to attend a zoom webinar led by Ricardo Diaz, 6-7pm, and sponsored by the Education Justice Project. (Member ID: 880 6571 1896 Password: 18225) It's easy to be discouraged by the news on immigration and deportation these days. However, there are many inspiring organizations that are working to support immigrants, fight against deportations, and make our communities more welcoming. Here in Champaign-Urbana, Ricardo Diaz is a participant in many of these efforts. Ricardo will share both local and national efforts, including the new Champaign County Welcoming Plan and the results of the National Immigrant Integration Conference happening this month. He'll put our local efforts into a state-wide and nationwide context and describe how these efforts are successfully decreasing deportations and creating more welcoming communities. Ricardo is a principal at XPenn Consultants, which works with companies to create more inclusive

workplaces for Latino and Spanish-speaking employees and offers intercultural training. A native of Mexico, Ricardo moved to the U.S. at age 12. Among his volunteer efforts are serving as a board member of the C-U Immigration Forum and Champaign County Health Care Consumers; chairman of the board of the New American Welcome Center and for the Immigration Project ; and chairman of Urbana's Civilian Police Review Board.

We've been blessed for nearly a year now with the help of a team of caring medical professionals who have stepped up meet this challenge and bring health care services directly to our friends. On the third Thursday of each month, <u>Dr. Ashok Jagasia</u> and his crew provide a free health clinic here at our facilities. Dr. Jagazia is an Ear, Nose & Throat Specialist affiliated with the <u>Rush University Medical Center</u> in Chicago and <u>Christie Clinic</u> locally. He has over 22 years of experience in the medical field and has traveled throughout the world providing free health care to disadvantaged populations.

This week, on-site health care services have been expanded to included a **telemedicine** clinic every Tuesday afternoon, providing our friends access to an even broader range of clinical services. Dozens of the people we serve have benefited from these opportunities to receive medical care in a familiar setting, provided by professionals who genuinely care about their well-being. We appreciate the compassion and dedication of "Dr. J" and his team!

<u>Mission Aviation Fellowship</u> is inviting us to view a new movie called **Ends of the Earth**, to be in theaters October 18 and 21. A documentary exploring faith, passion and how hope emerges from tragedy, **Ends of the Earth** weaves together true stories of MAF pilots – past and present –

**Frontera de Cristo** shared some news – Our children's enrichment ministry is expanding! We are now working in partnership with DouglaPrieta Trabaja to provide quality personalized educational, emotional, and spiritual support for 25 children (and their families) who have gotten left behind during the time of pandemic and are at risk of dropping out of school.

In addition to the more traditional academic support, they participate in <u>DouglaPrieta's</u> <u>permaculture program</u>, cultivating food and learning to care for creation. Their families participate in workshops on domestic violence prevention and parental support.

Join us in gratitude for our wonderful Children's Enrichment team and in prayer as we seek to expand the ministry in partnership with the Lirio de los Valles Church and other organizations in different parts of the city.
